26	1. Approval of the Minutes		
27	The minutes of the December 11, 2019 Senate meeting were approved by voice vote with the		
28	following correction: that lines 151-155 reflect that after a discussion ensued, the Senate proceeded		
29	to a vote on the amendment as amended.

31	2. Announcements and Communications		
32	a. Report of the President—		
33			
34	Dr. Lemons welcomed all to the first meeting of the semester and briefed on several		
35	announcements. He paid mention to a memorandum from the University on the Coronavirus,		
36	which offered guidance to faculty, staff, and students. Dr. Lemons assured that there was no		
37	cause for immediate concern and that the information provided detailed recent developments		
38	regarding the outbreak. He went on to provide an update on the State Executive Budget and		

informed that the Governor proposed a \$24 million increase for CUNY senior colleges,

which would be distributed among several categories, including fringe benefits and Open

Education Resources; and informed, additionally, that the SNAP program would be expanded. Dr. Lemons also shared that over the course of several meetings, legislators began to ask him questions about the TAP gap. He expressed that such was a positive sign as legislators are not only interested in understanding the issue, but have also become aware of a point that requires correction. Dr. Lemons maintained that he would continue to meet with legislators in order to push the Lehman College agenda forward, and shared that he would have the opportunity to do so in upcoming meetings this February.

Dr. Lemons announced that there were nine open college presidencies at CUNY and that Lehman was one of those Colleges. A search committee, he explained, was in development and the search for the position would be open in the summer and continue into the fall. Dr. Lemons assured that as the search progresses, the College and its mission would continue to move forward as planned.

Dr. Lemons referred to his monthly email updates and informed of two noteworthy accomplishments on the website GradReports. He announced that Lehman's Speech Pathology program was rated 10th among schools in the U.S. that provide a Master's in Speech Pathology, and that the College's Social Work program was also among the top 25 U.S. colleges that provide a Bachelor's degree in Social Work. Dr. Lemons congratulated both programs and thanked faculty and administrators for their role in their respective achievement.

b. Student Legislative Assembly—

Mr. Jose Acevedo discussed the issue of student attendance at committee meetings. He explained that nearly all of the committees would have a lack of student representation of one or more students for the spring semester, particularly due to class schedules and the lack of free hours. To better accommodate students, Mr. Acevedo asked faculty and staff to be mindful of the issue moving forward and urged that they schedule committee meetings after the start of each semester.

Senate Standing Committee Elections

- Students serve 1-year terms; these seats are traditionally filled in the Senate using a slate prepared by the Student Body in the beginning each academic year.
- The administrative representative is appointed by the President at the beginning of the academic year.
- Upcoming faculty vacancies are filled in a 3-step process (see attached flyer) as outlined in the Senate ByLaws.
- The nomination solicitation is sent to all faculty and staff through email (see attached). This Spring, the solicitation will be sent out on Monday, March 2nd.
- Standing Committee Chairs will be contacted with a list of those committee members whose terms expire at the end of this Spring term.

Senate ByLaws Revisions

- On Thursday, January 23rd, the Governance Committee reviewed the Senate ByLaws. This
 conversation was led by Duane Tananbaum.
- The Governance Committee discussed changes to modernize existing language and to eliminate unnecessary/outdated policies.
- The Governance Committee also recommended adding a Standing Committee on Assessment. This was recommended by Middle States and will serve as way to ensure that assessment is regularly done with "buy-in" and input from all constituents: faculty, students, and administration.

There is no certification for teaching art at the early childhood/elementary level. Students who wish to teach studio art must select the Art Teacher program offered by the Department of Middle and High School Education, which leads to certification from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. See the section on Program Requirements for Undergraduate Secondary Teacher Education of Middle and High School Education in this Bulletin.

4. Rationale (Explain how this change will impact learning outcomes of the department and Major/Program):

The Art History degree is currently designated as a specialization or sub-plan within studio art in the Art Department. Students currently receive a bachelor of arts (B.A.) degree in Art with a specialization in art history. This is not logical or representative of degree requirements because no studio art classes are required for the B.A. degree in art history. The name of the degree should be in accordance with the reality of the program and its coursework requirements.

It is hoped that this change will encourage enrollment for majors in art history by appealing to those students seeking a robust humanities liberal arts course of study. Students interested in majoring in art history likely assume some/any studio art making classes are required, which is not accurate.

In the Preparation for Teaching section, since the Department of Education no longer designates only specific undergraduate majors, which used to include art history, as approved majors for students with an Education Minor seeking to apply for certification

as an ECCE (Early Childhood and Childhood teacher, this requirement is now obsolete and this information is unnecessary.

The changing of the specialization in Art History into a separate major does not replace or change the requirements for the Studio Art specialization, which will eventually become the only requirements for the Art BA.
